Although the format is changing, the content of the publication will remain the same.

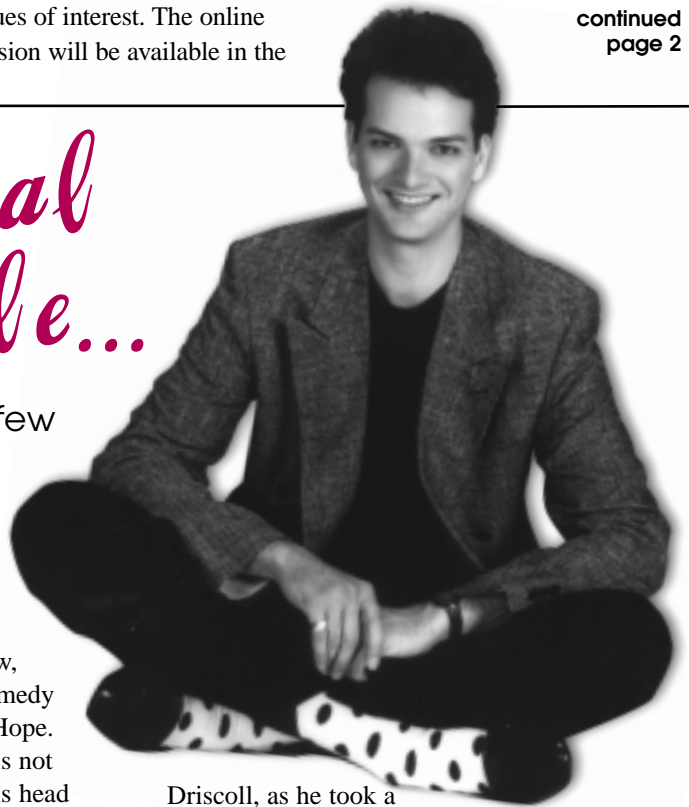
